

## LEGISLATIVE REPORT #288

Governor Signs AB 72 (Bonta) - Balance Billing Prohibition on Out-of-Network Non-emergency Medical Services

**September 23, 2016:** Governor Brown signed AB 72 along with a group of other bills he described as consumer protection bills. CA-ACC remained Opposed to this bill to the end.

AB 72 was a follow up to AB 533 (Bonta) which was killed on the Assembly Floor last year. AB 72 is meant to address the issue of balance billing patients when they receive non-emergency medical services from an out-of-network physician at an in-network facility.

Below is a table to show the different versions of bills on this topic along with the main provisions of the bill. Although the bill was signed and I understand our disappointment and concern in what the future will hold, due to our advocacy efforts, we were able to limit the damage. Many of the changes made from AB 533 to the final version of AB 72 were the result of our involvement.
